Executive Director's Report

Canada faced one of its worst wildfire seasons on record in 2017 making The ChariTree Foundation's children's environmental education and tree planting program more important than ever. Kids want to help and ChariTree wants to help kids who love trees and are concerned about their future.

The ChariTree Foundation is Canada's national environmental education charity for children. Let's give kids opportunities to fall in love with nature in order to protect it ~ because you protect what you love.

These days many children have less time and fewer opportunities to connect with nature. This is a real loss because research shows that contact with nature makes kids feel better about themselves. ChariTree strives to give as many children as we can a tree of their own. It's about supporting environmental education programs for children by giving kids a tree to plant at their home, camp or school that is native to their region ~ and an opportunity to connect with nature and contribute positively to their world.

Canada is home to 10% of the world's forests but millions of Canada's trees are lost to forest fires, insect infestations, extreme weather and logging each year. Kids understand that trees increase biodiversity, prevent floods and landslides, store carbon, protect water sources, provide shelter, boost healing and wellbeing and so much more - they get that trees are worth protecting and planting.

"We have planted all 150 trees in honour of Canada's 150. Thanks for all your help in making this happen," said Liz Greenway, Manager of Camping and Outdoor Education, Camp Tapawingo in Ontario.









In 2017, The ChariTree Foundation gave close to 10,000 children at schools and camps across Canada tree seedlings to plant in honour of Canada 150.

"We incorporated the tree planting activity as part of our Canada 150 theme. The campers were really excited that they were planting a grove of trees to commemorate this milestone. They also loved the idea that they would be creating something that would become a permanent feature of camp, for future campers to enjoy," said Ilana Stoch, Director, Camp Kodiak. "Most campers had never had an opportunity to plant a tree before, so this was also a new and fun experience for them. Thank you so much ChariTree!"

Under the direction of the Canadian Camping Association's Catherine Ross, the CCA continues to partner with The ChariTree Foundation and they are again providing volunteers in each program to reduce shipping costs to ChariTree.



The ChariTree Foundation is growing and had its first tree planting project in The Yukon in 2017! Kids attending camp at The Yukon Wildlife Preserve planted 22 three-year-old Birch and White Spruce Wish Trees last June. (See photo above)

I continue to keep overhead expenses low and no longer take management fees or any compensation. "Our wish is that the trees we planted will help our community and our world." - students at Stobart Community School.


9,725 trees were given to children by The ChariTree Foundation in 2017
